BY AND ABOUT WOMEN: 600-1960

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The journal appears semiannually in the Spring and Fall of each year. The annual bibliography of women and literature appears in the Fall issue of each volume.

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1976 Bibliography of Literature in English

by and about Women: 600-1960

This is the third annual Women and Literature bibliography; as before, it indexes literature published in Great Britain, the United States, Africa, Canada, India, and Australia. Entries are coded by genre and historical period. This provides the user with more information than would a heterogeneous list, and arranges related works under one rubric--e.g., all 20th century American novelists are found under 7.3., all Renaissance women dramatists under 1.6. "Literature" includes letters (.5), diaries (.5), and speeches (.8). Children are included (.9) not as subjects of "womanly" concern, but as unwilling victims of repression and discrimination. Here is a sample entry, followed by an explanation of its code.

Under each author, all articles other than reviews appear first, in alphabetical order; reviews follow in a separate alphabetized list.

The bibliography would not exist without faithful volunteers, whose helpfulness, enthusiasm, and accuracy made editing a much easier task. The Graduate College of the University of Iowa funded a research assistantship in 1976-77, and the Department of English was generous in provision of work-study aid. I am especially grateful to Nancy Johnson, whose summer-long efforts added completeness and precision. The National Endowment for the Humanities has awarded Women and Literature a small grant for enlargement of the bibliography, and compilation will gradually be transferred to Douglass College at Rutgers; Lynn Miller has tentatively agreed to oversee the future preparation.

We hope our effort will encourage feminists to study the many women in literary and intellectual history whose works are unknown or disregarded, as well as the few whose writings have already been discussed in hundreds of articles and scores of books.
